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Introduction

In two other documents I have described the results of research to indirectly establish the ancestors of John and Catherine Snyder, who are enumerated in the 1850 Marion Co., OH, census. (See https://www.familysearch.org/ark:/61903/1:1:MXQL-MV2.) These are 3rd great grandparents of mine. The indirect approach was suggested by the proximity of this Snyder family to three others with characteristics that looked very similar to those of the Snyder family. Those characteristics are . . .

- Parents born in PA prior to about 1810
- First children born in PA
- Subsequent children born in OH
- Implied migration to OH in 1832-1834
- Germanic names
- Proximity to the Snyder family in Waldo Twp, Marion County, OH, in 1850

The three families of greatest interest were all on the same page of the 1850 census: William & Anna Selanders, Simon & Ellen Culp, and Henry & Sarah Coleman. Of these three, I chose to investigate just the Selanders and Culp families. During these investigations, however, another possible connection between Selanders, Coleman, and Snyder families surfaced, and I will describe it later. (See the section starting at page 34.)

The results of the two investigations can be found in these documents: "Children of Johann Christian & Anna Maria Selanders" and "Simon Culp and Ellen Selanders of PA, OH, KS." The research did not reveal a relationship between the Snyder and Selanders families, except that of proximity in in OH in 1850. In the case of the Culp investigation, however, in addition to the physical proximity relationship, I discovered through DNA matching (using my mother's DNA) that there is a clear relationship between the Snyder and Culp families. One generation back from John and Catherine Snyder and Simon Culp there was probably a common ancestor. The most likely scenario seems to be that one of Catherine Snyder's parents (probably the father) was a Culp and that Simon (and his two brothers) were Catherine's siblings. So far this is only a conjecture that needs to be proven/dis-proven.

Research did show a relationship between the William Selanders family and that of Simon Culp, however. So it is clear from conventional research and DNA mapping that these three families knew each other well. Here are some details in the context of the 1850 census.

The Snyder family in 1850 is shown below.

The Culp and Selanders families are shown below. The fact that William Selanders' sister, Ellen, was Simon Culp's wife is called out. And, for possible future reference, the identity of William's wife (i.e., Anna Boyer) is noted. The Boyer surname appears later with the husband of the Snyder daughter Elizabeth shown above, but I have never been able to make a solid connection with this possible hint.

Details of the analysis that led to these bits of information can be found in the two documents noted above. The purpose of this document is explain the research that I have done to directly explore for the ancestors of John Snyder and to find the ultimate fate of John and Catherine.

Ohio Hints

Following are descriptions of various attempts to find more information about the John and Catherine Snyder family from records in OH. The 1850 census implies that the family moved from PA in about 1832-1834, so there may be a census record in 1840 for the family. Since I have not found a death/burial record for either John or Catherine, it is possible that they are recorded in the 1860 census as well.

In addition, there are some relatively obscure grave site records from Marion County as well as will/probate information to review. There are summaries of what is known about each of the Snyder children identified in the 1850 census.

1840 Census

Following are descriptions of three attempts to find the family of John and Catherine in 1840.

John Snyder Query

For this investigation, I looked at all census records for John Snyder (including name variants) across the entire state. One reason for doing this is that county boundaries changed between 1840 and 1850, and I did not want to overlook the fact that the Snyders may have appeared in a county other than Marion. Here is a table that shows the results of the 1840 query. Of those 106 records, 102 seemed easy to reject and marked with an "x", three were close and marked with a "c", and one was closer than the others and marked with an "m". In spite of all this, there is no clear match to the 1850 John and Catherine Snyder family in the 1850 census. The analysis took into account the ages of the various people as implied in the 1850 census - Susanna 8, Elizabeth 6, George 3, Martha unborn, John 36, Catherine 45. Snyders in Marion County Query

Focusing just on people with the Snyder name who appear in the 1840 census in Marion County, a query produced the following list. The significance of this comes from the possibility that John Snyder was born as John Jacob Snyder. This is a conjecture that is explained later. Perhaps he occurs with a name other than John. Unfortunately, none of the families in the list look to me as if they are the family of John and Catherine Snyder.

Daughter Susanna (Snyder) Loy

Susanna is my great-great grandmother. She married John Loy in March of 1857 and was gone from the scene some time between when the 1860 census was taken in July, 1860, and Dec., 1863, when John married Maria Augenstein. Presumably Susanna died during this three year period, but I have seen no record of her death. Susanna was John's third wife, and she cared for his children by his second wife, who incidentally were born in Baden. She and John had two children – Christina in 1857 and Sam in 1859. Sam is my great grandfather, and I have written about his life and that of his father in some detail.

Descendants of Susanna Snyder and John Loy are apparent in DNA testing at 23andme and ancestry. It is this data that has led me to Susanna's mtDNA haplogroup and the conclusion that the last daughter of John's is not with Susanna but perhaps with Maria Augenstein. (Susanna's mtDNA haplogroup and hence that for her mother Catherine is T2F1.)

Aside: John/Johann Loy/Lay is an interesting character with a string of 4-5 wives during his roughly 72 years. He is a carpenter/cabinet maker from Baden. In Baden he first marries a cousin who dies in childbirth. Then he marries a widow, with whom he has five children – four that survive and make the voyage to the USA. Somewhere during the voyage or shortly after arrival (1853) the second wife disappears from the scene. John marries Susanna in 1857, and they have two children. In 1864 he marries Mariah Augustine (probably Maria Augenstein), and Sarah Ann Loy is born in the same year. In the 1870 census, John appears in two entries for Van Wert Co. – in Jennings township with an obviously blended family of his children and those of a woman named Catherine from Hesse Darmstadt and in the village of Van Wert alone as a carpenter. In 1880 John is living solo in Lima, OH, and it appears that this Catherine is still living with children by another marriage in the village of Van Wert. John dies in 1892, having been living with his youngest daughter Sarah Ann (married to Samuel Archer) in Allen Co., OH. I suspect that the potential wife number 5 who appears in the 1870 Van Wert census is Catherine Klinger, who had been married to Samuel Louth. I am still working to verify the parts of this story with more concrete evidence than the census information.

Daughter Elizabeth (Snyder) Boyer

Susanna's sister, Elizabeth, was born in 1834 in OH. This was probably not long after the Snyder family had arrived in OH. In 1859, Elizabeth married Jacob Boyer.

Jacob had been married previously to a lady named Lucinda Tarr, with whom he may have had two children (John William and Mary Ellen). Jacob served in the Union Army. With Elizabeth he had five children (Lenora, Martha, Jacob, George, Samuel) from what I can tell.

Luckily, a record from the 1890 census survives that shows Jacob. It confirms his service during the civil war, and it records the fact that he was wounded. The record indicates that he is living in Claridon, (Marion Co.,) OH. Here is the reference. Probably Elizabeth and Jacob were still living in Claridon, OH, in 1900. However, this would be <u>inconsistent</u> with a death record (March 1900) for Elizabeth. See "Ohio, County Death Records, 1840-2001," database with images, *FamilySearch* (<u>https://familysearch.org/ark:/61903/1:1:F662-JT5</u> : 1 March 2021), Elizabeth Boyer, Mar 1900; citing Death, Claridon, Claridon Township, Marion, Ohio, United States, source ID v 3 p 11, County courthouses, Ohio; FHL microfilm 384,350. This record shows her age as 61, which is about right. But, there is an entry later on the same page for Mary E. Boyer (death on 14-October-1900). This would be consistent with the 1900 Census. The problem with this, however, is that her age (53) is many years too young. The most that can be concluded wityh certainty is that Elizabeth died in 1900, after the census was taken in June of that year.

There is a likely headstone for Jacob shown in findagrave.com that was ordered in 1961 showing a death for Jacob in 1899. This date on the stone may be wrong based on the information from the 1900 census. See "Find A Grave Index," database, *FamilySearch* (https://www.familysearch.org/ark:/61903/1:1:QVKX-VF6B : 30 May 2020), Jacob Boyer, ; Burial, , ; citing record ID , *Find a Grave*, http://www.findagrave.com. The following record of burial may be the correct one. "Ohio, Grave Registrations of Soldiers, 1810-1955", database, *FamilySearch* (https://www.familysearch.org/ark:/61903/1:1:D65L-R5N2 : 9 November 2020), Jacob S. Alias Boyer, Jacob Boyer, 1905. If so, then Jacob's death occurred in 1905 (after that of Elizabeth), and the 1900 census makes more sense.

Clearly the records are confusing, but it does appear that Jacob and Elizabeth ended their lives in the vicinity of Claridon some time around 1900-1905.

Along the way, I found no reasonable hint about the fate of John and Catherine Snyder. My indirect connection to Boyer descendants has been confirmed through DNA matching at ancestry.com using my mother's DNA.

Son George Snyder

George was born in 1837 according to the 1850 census. I have found no credible records of a marriage or death. He was also of prime age for participating to the Civil War, but I have not clearly found him in military records. He maybe identified as Private George Snyder, who served from April, 1861, until September 25, 1862, in company H of the 4th Ohio Infantry. DNA testing has so far not yielded any clues. See pages 120 & 126 of the *Marion County Roll of Honor* -

If this is indeed the right George Snyder, then he was killed near Murfreeboro, TN, at the Stones River Battle. See <u>https://www.nps.gov/stri/learn/historyculture/battle0.htm</u>. However, following may be the right record and it would show that he enlisted in the same unit (4th Ohio Volunteer Infantry) as brother in-law Jacob Boyer, who enlisted about two months after him. If this is the case, then George may have been fatally wounded at Antietam and died on the way to Harper's Ferry. See

Daughter Martha Snyder

Martha was born in 1841 according to the 1850 census. That is the only record of her that I have found. Is it significant that her sister Elizabeth named a daughter born in 1860 Martha? Perhaps Martha died sometime between the 1850 census and 1860.

1860 Census

In 1860 I believe that John and Catherine's children are accounted for except Martha, who would be about 19 years old. Martha's siblings have either married or been killed in the Civil War. Unfortunately, I can find no record of her marriage or death. Since marriages are fairly well documented in the 1850s in Marion Co., I suspect that she may have died. Consequently, my best guess is that she died in the 1850s.

Given this suspicion, I looked for possible matches to the 1850 Snyder family of John and Catherine in 1860. In fact one family stands out. See <u>https://familysearch.org/ark:/61903/3:1:33SQ-GBSZ-FRG?</u> <u>cc=1473181&wc=7QGH-184%3A1589432777%2C158942242%2C1589423641</u>.

This family is in Pleasant Twp, and there are several discrepancies, so it may be a coincidence. The discrepancies compared to the 1850 census are . . .

- John is slightly too old (by 6 years)
- Catherine is too young (by 13 years!)
- Margaret should be Martha.
- The information about the family in the tree at familysearch.org is scattered and suspicious and probably largely wrong.

Probably this is not a match to the family of John and Catherine family in the 1850 census, but it is the closest match that I could find.

In the interest of completeness. Here is the full list of (9) Snyder people in 1860 in Marion Co., OH, where the birth location for the person is PA.

1870 Census

Covering one more decade, I searched for John and Catherine Snyder in the 1870 census in Marion and Delaware Counties. Cemetery Records

Will/Probate Records

Unfortunately, there were no clues about John and Catherine, but the information is interesting in other terms.

Jonathan Snyder

This Jonathan Snyder was born about 1805 in PA and moved to Marion Co., OH. He was Married to Margaret (Keagle?), and it appears that they had no children. He is the brother of the George Snyder whose will follows. Jonathan died in 1855 in Pleasant Twp and his findagrave memorial is 103818190. According to the 1840 census, they were somehow associated with Leander Harmon, whose relationship to them is not clear to me. 25It is my will that at the death of my wife my executor proceed to sell all such personal estate as shall be then remaining and also all of my real estate wherever situate, and that of the proceeds of such sales he pay any debts my said wife may have left unpaid, and her funer al expenses and then distribute the remainder among my heirs at law, according to their respective interests."

"5 Should my said wifes debts and funeral expenses be paid, either from the proceeds of the sale of the personal property left at her death, or, by my heirs, and should all of my said heirs agree upon an amicable division of my real estate, then it is my will that my executor by sufficient deed of conveyance convey to each of my said heirs, his or her portion of said real estate according to such amicable division otherwise my said executor is to sell all of said real estate without reserve."

That the heirs of said George Snyder, deceased, have agreed upon an amtcable division of the real estate of which said testator died seized, and have caused a survey to be made thereof, and assigned to each the portion which it was agreed among them should be held by each respectively.

Unfortunately, this person is NOT directly related to the Jacob Boyer who married Elizabeth Snyder. It is interesting in that the executor named is a Jacob Klinefelter. This is the maiden surname for Elizabeth Snyder's mother in-law. Jacob Klinefelter may be Elizabeth's uncle in-law. Perhaps this is a small world thing, but there may be some other significance.

William's family was next to that of John and Catherine in the 1850 census. Here is a copy of probate case 606 from Marion County in 1862.

At this point it is appropriate to point out another potentially significant clue regarding the interrelatedness of the Selanders, Snyder, Culp, and Coleman families.) This was mentioned in the introduction.) The clue stems from an investigation into Valentine Coleman, the husband of Mary Selanders, daughter of William Selanders. Valentine is noted as the executor for William's estate in the probate case above.

The relationship of Valentine to the Selanders family was noted in the document summarizing research into the Selanders families. See the section devoted to William Selanders, part of which I repeat here.

According to the information here, John may have been married to a Catherine Snyder. See <u>https://www.familysearch.org/tree/person/details/L6BV-VTH</u>. Perhaps this is a clue to the origins of the Snyder family in the area. (i.e., Catherine Snyder might be a sister to John Snyder. Evidence is missing.) John Coleman died in 1872 according to

<u>https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/29653257/john-coleman</u>. There is another older Valentine Coleman in the area as well – slightly younger than John. He is the source of some confusion in the complied records.

Remembering the family of Henry Coleman from the introduction sparked an investigation of the Coleman families in Marion County. - In 1850 there were three Valentine Colemans living in Marion Co. - one born in about 1889 in PA, one born in about 1816 in PA, and one born in 1828 on OH and


living with the Valentine Coleman born in 1889. Presumably this third Valentine is the son of the eldest Valentine, and he is the one that married Mary Selanders. A quick search of familysearch.org reveals this person - https://www.familysearch.org/tree/person/details/LKR4-3BX. The first son of Mary and Valentine is named Henry, but he can not be the one that appears near near the Snyder and Selanders families in the 1850 census. The correct person is shown here -

https://www.familysearch.org/tree/person/details/L71P-K9G . This Henry appears to be the son of John Coleman (b.1786) and Catherine Snyder (b.1795). I suspect that John Coleman (b.1786) and Valentine Coleman (b.1789) were both sons of Valentine Coleman (b.1755) and Margdalena Spengler (b.1761). So, the Valentine Coleman that is executor in the will above is a cousin to Henry Coleman who lived near William Selanders, John Snyder, and Simon Culp. It is a somewhat twisted story, but it demonstrates that these families were geographically close in PA and OH, and they intermarried.




A Delaware County Note

A search of probate records held by Delaware County yielded just one item. The case involved John D. Snyder in 1859. This man (along with others) was brought before the court for selling illegal alcoholic beverages. He was a resident of Delaware. Because of this and the fact that I did not recognize his fellow offenders, I have assumed that this does not describe the John Snyder that I am reseraching.

Land Records

Background

The area of interest in Waldo Twp (Marion County) is a complicated area in terms of how it was originally subdivided and made available to "settlers" after it was taken from native tribes. Its boundaries now (and in 1850) are shown below in red in the context of Marion and surrounding counties. (See https://www.co.marion.oh.us/?page_id=1554 .) These boundaries have been in effect since about mid-1848.



In the roughly 15 years prior to that, when the Snyder, Selanders, Culp, etc. families lived after coming from PA, however, the county boundary between Delaware and Marion Counties appeared as follows. See







BLM Records

So, with this understanding of the area, what land/deed records exist that pertain to the Snyder family or their neighbors (particularly the Culp and Selanders families) in the 1850 census? First to BLM records. -

I searched the BLM general land office records for people with the Snyder surname in Marion Co. and found the following patent from 1832. It is for a quarter section in Pleasant Twp about midway between the village of Waldo and the city of Marion, held with in common with Henry Snyder. Its location is indicated in the map immediately above. See

The only Henry Snyder that I can find at familyserach.org is a person in his thirties at the time of the 1840 census, and this person may have died in 1841. This person was enumerated in Marion Twp, however. He and his wife and their three young children were living near a much older John Wolfe and another young family of Henry Wolfe. There is a Jonathan Snyder in the same township in the 1840 census, who perhaps is Henry's "partner," but this is speculation.

A similar search of patents in Delaware county for anyone with the Snyder surname returned an empty set. Searches for the names Selanders and Culp in both Marion and Delaware counties were fruitless as well.

County Records

County deed records exist at familyserach.org. They even have some indexes, but there are many entries. I have conducted some searches in Marion County records for Synder, Culp, and Selanders people to see if I can find examples where property ownership was transferred from them to someone else between about 1850 and 1870. Then, since grantee indexes exist for Delaware Co., I looked for situations in which one of the surnames of interest appeared as a grantee before about 1850. This approach is based on an assumption that land was acquired in the vicinity of Waldo before the county boundary shifted (when the Waldo area was in Delaware Co.) and then sold after the boundary shift in 1848.

Details follow, but a summary is that there are property transactions for Selanders and Culp family members in the U.S. Military District lands areas just east of the village of Waldo as well as slightly south to the village of Norton. I never found a property transaction that seemed to apply to the family of Catherine and John Snyder. Perhaps they were too poor to have purchased land and that is why he is listed as a laborer in the 1850 census.

In image 11, there is a transaction in which Anna Selanders obtains land from the county auditor on 4/18/1871. (This is after the death of husband William in 1862.) The property is section 3 of twp 7 rng 19. This property is not too far NE of the village of Waldo.

In image 10 of the index, there is an earlier transaction in which land (10 acres) in the same section is deeded to Anna Selanders by Jacob Coleman and wife Elvina. The date is 12/7/1862, and this is probably after the death of husband William. This 20 acre parcel is in the U.S. Military Reserve.

Snyder Transactions

None were found that appeared interesting – names, dates, locations too far from geographic area of interest.

Culp Transactions

Image 10 of <u>https://www.familysearch.org/ark:/61903/3:1:3QS7-L93H-CRQF?i=9&cat=252960</u> shows a number of transactions involving Andrew S. Culp, the son of the Andrew who is the brother of Simon Culp. These transactions (purchases) are in the 1880s involving land in section 19 of twp 7 rng 19, which is just a short distance east of the village of Waldo in the U.S. Military District. (The property descriptions are amusing , being metes and bounds using poles and links and perches for distances relative to things like rocks!)

Image 9 of the same reference given above shows a few more transaction involving Andrew S. Culp and land east of Waldo. In addition, however, there are two transactions involving Andrew Culp (the father). These involve land in twp 7 rng 19 in the 1860s. An example is a transaction from 11/24/1869 involving Henry Strine. Andrew's wife Leah signs the deed, so the identity of Andrew as the father is proven. See image 533 of <u>https://www.familysearch.org/ark:/61903/3:1:3QS7-893H-7DF2?</u> i=532&cat=252960.

Image 8 shows another transaction involving Andrew Culp. This transaction also involves land in section 12 of twp 7 rng 19 (40 acres). The date is 3/21/1857, and it involves Adam Pfirsch. Andrew (of Franklin Co., PA) is buying 40 acres (partly bounded by land owned by Henry Strine. Perhaps this takes place are Andrew moves from PA to OH. See image 190 of




Pretty clearly Simon and Eleanor (Selanders) Culp were tied into people in the community of Norton, including the brothers William Glaze (1829-1914) and Benjamin Glaze (1833-1890), who married Simon and Eleanor's daughter Caroline Culp. Children inter-married and land was exchanged. No sign of Snyder folks, however.


1835 Male Residents

There is a reference text from the Delaware Co. Historical Society that shows male inhabitants of Delaware Co. in 1835. Searching for Culp, Snyder, Selanders, and Glaze yielded the following list. Other than names, no other information is provided.

William Glaze is already known from evidence presented above. It is not clear if the three Snider men are related to the John Snyder about whom I am seeking information. US Military District Bounty Lands

It is possible that a Culp, Selanders, or Snyder person was originally granted bounty land for service in the Revolutionary War. The US Military District in OH is a possible suspect place based on the presence of these people in or near the district around 1850. Perhaps they acquired bounty land in the 1830s from someone else. I have not delved into sources about this land, except to identify where a person might look. Genealogical sources pertinent to the military district can be found at familysearch.org - https://www.familysearch.org/en/wiki/United_States_Military_District_Genealogy .

The US National Archives has some early bounty land information for the Military District. See <u>https://catalog.archives.gov/id/567388</u>.

Familysearch.org has images from a register of land warrants for the Military Distric of Ohio as follows: <u>https://www.familysearch.org/search/catalog/249409?availability=Family+History+Library</u>.

On the single roll of this microcopy is reproduced a register of bounty-land warrants, 1799-1805, which were surrendered for land in the Military District of Ohio. Under the Military Bounty Land Acts of July 9, 1788 (Journals of the Continental Congress, v. 34, p. 307, 308), and of March 3, 1803 (2 Stat. 236), the Federal Government granted public land to veterans and heirs of veterans of the Revolutionary War. Under an act of June 1, 1796 (1 Stat. 490), a U.S. Military District in Ohio was reserved solely for the use of these warrants.

After a veteran's application had been approved, he was issued a warrant entitling him to "locate" a specified number of acres on the public domain. He could himself present the warrant at a district land office and ask that a patent be issued for a particular tract; he could sell the warrant to someone else who might use it to obtain title to land; or under the scrips act warrants could be exchanged for land scrip, which in turn could be used to pay for public land.

The entries in the register are arranged chronologically. Each entry shows the name of the person who presented the warrant and therefore received a patent for the land, the name of the person who originally received the warrant for military service, his rank, and a legal description of the land in terms of lot, quarter section, township, and range. Most of the warrants were surrendered in groups of 4,000 acres by individuals who bought warrants from veterans or their heirs.

There are 311 images to be investigated here, and I have not done that work.

Originally the lands in the U.S. Military District of Ohio were to be distributed by January 1, 1800. By the end of 1802 about 14,000 warrants had been issued for 1,612,605 acres, of which 552,605 acres had not been located. To provide additional time to locate warrants, and also to grant warrants to soldiers who had made late applications or had not completed their claims, Congress passed the act of March 3, 1803, which was amended by the act of April 15, 1806. After 1806 Congress periodically extended the time limit necessary for registering and locating the warrants.


Until 1830 all U.S. Revolutionary War bounty land warrants, as distinct from Revolutionary War bounty land warrants issued by the States or through special acts of Congress, could be used to locate land only in the U.S. Military District of Ohio. By an act of May 30, 1830 (4 Stat. 423), scrip certificates were issued in exchange for unused warrants and could be used to purchase land in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois. By an act of July 27, 1842 (5 Stat. 497), the scrip was honored for any land open in the public domain.

The warrants and related papers reproduced in this publication are arranged by date of act and thereunder in numerical sequence. The first series includes U.S. military bounty land warrants issued under the act of July 9, 1788, which are numbered 1-14220.

There are many images here to be reviewed, and I have not done the work.

The Ohio Genealogical Society also has a reference that lists some early land records for the US Military District. See

I requested a "copy service request" form to see if there are entries for Culp or Snyder. The result was null for Culp, but three Snyder entries surfaced: one for a Henry Snider in Ross Co. consisting of 2 tracts of a total of 167 acres dated around 1800; one for Philip Snyder (!) in Scioto Co. consisting of 400 acres dated in 1800; one for J. Snyder consisting of the NE quarter of section 8 of Twp 3 Rng 14 (about 162 acres in Licking Co.(?)) dated Jan, 1828. None of these three appear relevant to the current search.



A search of <u>http://catalog.wrhs.org/collections/search</u> (Western Reserve Historical Society) turned up no new sources.

PA Hints

Looking for John Snyder and his wife Catherine with few clues may be a fool's errand. In the 1700s there were probably hundreds or thousands of people with the Snyder surname name, and the same can certainly be said of their given names. There is even one governor named Snyder from 1807-1817, and there is a county named Snyder, although it was not carved out from Union Co. until 1855.

Cumberland County is a natural place to start to look because of the evidence associated with the Selanders and Culp families that were neighbors to the Snyder family in OH in 1850. The following sections are an attempt to discover some possibly relevant information based on hints from perviously named sources that provide rough birth dates.

Birth in Cumberland County?

There is the following baptismal record that caught my eye because of the date, the location, and the given name information. If this record actually pertains to the John Snyder that I am seeking, then significant bits of information are (1) the location (New Kingstown) in Silver Spring Twp just to the northwest of Mechanicsburg, (2) the identity of a father named Phillip Snyder, (3) a specific Lutheran church, and (4) a specific birth date - 1/7/1804.

Examining the records for this church (St. Stephen's Evangelical Lutheran) in the book *Cumberland County Pennsylvania Church Records of the 18th Century* by F. Edward Wright, ISBN 978-0-7884-7691-4, pp. 65-70. led me to another intriguing family that included a first son Phillip, who may be the father named above. Here is a list if the births/baptisms for the family of Phillip Schneider and his wife Barbara (unknown surname).

Witnesses along the way included these: Phillip Langsdorf, Susanna Emminger, Balthazar and Susanna Schneider, Wilhem Bohr, Maria Magdalena (?), Martin Langsdorf, Anna Margred, Johann Seiler and Anna Maria (Seiler?), George Bauer and Anna Maria (Bauer?). These associations may prove useful in future research. [Some of these names can be found in land tract information as well.]

This adds one child (Michael) to the family above, and it shows the separate birth of Johann Jacob in 1804 as well as the birth of a Johannes in 1801, possibly to the second son of Phillip and Barbara.

The baptism for first son Phillip is recorded here as well. "Pennsylvania Births and Christenings, 1709-1950", database, *FamilySearch* (<u>https://familysearch.org/ark:/61903/1:1:V2NP-QND</u> : 15 February 2020), Phillip Schneider, 1775.

So, one line of investigation then might involve the proposal that Phillip (b.1774) is the father of the child Johann Jacob b. 1804 and noted above. This could be him in the 1800 census in Franklin Twp. - "United States Census, 1800," database with images, *FamilySearch* (https://familysearch.org/ark:/61903/3:1:33S7-9R8K-9G4C?cc=1804228&wc=3V1X-CX6%3A1585149703%2C1585149702%2C1585149713 : 10 June 2015), Pennsylvania > Cumberland > Frankford > image 5 of 5; citing NARA microfilm publication M32, (Washington D.C.: National Archives and Records Administration, n.d.). Based on location (Frankford Twp) this may not be the same Phillip, however.

In what follows, I will focus on the name Phillip Snyder just to illustrate the kind of information that is available. Perhaps one day it turns out to be particularly relevant to my search for the origins of John and Catherine Snyder.

However, another less likely option to investigate is the family of Johannes Schneider (b. 1778). They appear to be having children in 1801. See the child named Johannes above born in 1801. Perhaps they had a son named John in about 1804.

From this it is clear that there was a concentration of Snyder holdings in Frankford Twp with a secondary concentration in West Pennsboro, which could also be interpreted as being in roughly the same area. Possible family clusters could be centered on the following people: Balthazar Snyder, two people named Phillip Snyder, and a cluster around George Snyder. Perhaps the John Snyder that I am seeking information about is associated with one of these groups. See the map that follows in a later section for a spatial representation.



There are two entries for Phillip Snyder. Both are shown as farmers. One (the "senior") is listed next to John Snyder. And, again there is a Culp family nearby – Jacob Culp (86th "C" entry).

1790-1830 Federal Census Enumerations

This section is devoted to a review of Cumberland County census information for the time period 1790-1830. First there is a review of information from familysearch.org for Selanders and Culp families. A section for Snyder families follows.

Selanders Families

See the separate document devoted to descendants of Christian Selanders for details. Valentine, Francis, and William are circled because of their familial relationships and because William is associated with John & Catherine Snyder in the 1850 OH census.

This happens to be the location of the marriage of Simon Culp to Ellen Selanders (William's sister) in 1828. The church is in Mechanicsburg, on the border between Silver Spring Twp and Hampden Twp.

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Culp Families

See the separate document about Culp families for details. The Simon Culp name is circled because of the association of that name with the family of John <u>& catherine Snyder in the 1850 OH</u> census.

The 1830 entry is the one already mentioned in which the entry for Simon is next to that for Valentine Selanders. This Simon and his wife are in their 20s, with one young girl (under 5). Circumstantial evidence of a relationship. (Simon's wife, Ellen, is a daughter of Valentine.) Also worth noting is that Emminger families appear on this page. This is a name that appears in at least one of the baptismal records for the children of Phillip Snyder.

The entry in 1800 in Frankford Twp can not be the same Simon Culp because he was probably not born at the time. This may be a record of his purported father of the same name. This Simon Culp is between 27-45 and his wife may be older. They have a number of small children, four girls under 10, one of whom might be the Catherine that married John Snyder.

The 1810 entry may be for the elder Culp's family. If so, the family has added many children in the preceding decade. (boys: 4 under 10, 2 between 10-15; girls: 1 under 10, 3 between 10-15, and 1 between 16-25) The older girl



The Phillip Snyder entries are as expected based on the 1793 census and tax information from assorted years.

The one in Frankford Twp is between 27-45 years old, has a wife in the same range, and there are two sons (0-10 and 11-16) and six daughters (five under 10 and one between 11-16).

The one in East Pennsboro/Allen Two is also between 27-45 years old, but his wife is younger (17-26). Also present are one young son and two young daughters, all under 10 years old. Probably this is the family of the Phillip Snyder b.1774 mentioned above in the baptismal records from St. Stephen's Church in New Kingstown. See

It is not clear how/if these two people of roughly the same generation are related.

Here are the results of a query for just John Snyder families. This is the first census in which the John Snyder that I am seeking would be expected to (maybe) have a residence and family of his own.

A few entries are selected circled based on proximity of other people of interest (e.g., Selanders, Culp, Phillip Snyder). These are just arbitrary and speculative selections. The only entries not selected are those for Centre County and South Middleton Twp.

There are six entries of potential interest based on this filter. Each is

A similar query for Jacob Snyder returned an empty set. Looking for Schneider/Snider also made no difference.

And, as another note, there is a Phillip Snyder in Union Twp, Centre County, to go along with the John Snyder in Centre County above. Phillip is in his 30s and his wife is in her 20s, and they have one small boy. Actually there are many Snyder families in Union Twp. The John Snyder one has four children, the man is in his 20s, but the woman in the family is in her 60s. Consequently, these families are eliminated from consideration.

If John and Catherine are married by 1830, they most likely do not appear in the Cumberland County census for 1830. There are many possible reasons for this – not married yet for example.

Briefly, the county is currently divided into 22 townships as shown here. According to the US Gen Web project referenced above, there were originally four townships - "Townships 1-6 were formed from the original **East Pennsborough Twp**; 7-9 from the original **Middleton Twp**; 10-15 from the original **West Pennsborough Twp**; 16-22 from the original **Hopewell Twp**." Formation dates for the four "kernel townships" are 1745, 1810, 1745, and 1735, respectively. This is important because many of the sources used here date to times prior to the subdivision of the kernel townships.

The three largest cities (boroughs) in the county are **Shippensburg**, settled in 1733 and originally embedded in Hopewell Twp, **Carlisle**, settled in 1751 and embedded in Middleton Twp, and **Mechanicsburg**, settled in the early 1800s and straddling the boundary between Silver Spring and Allen Twps in the original East Pennsboro Twp.



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that I regard as significant. There are obvious limitations reflecting limitations in the source records. For example, it may be hard to differentiate one Phillip Snyder from another, given that one Phillip Snyder father and his son had identical last names. Also, the fact that I have focused on the name Phillip Snyder based on a birth record that may or may not pertain to the John Snyder in whom I have an interest is an obvious limitation. Be that as it may, the tags cluster in two groups – one eastern and one western. Sections that follow examine the tags in each group.



The instances of Simon Culp in the 1800 and 1810 census enumerations can not be for the Simon Culp who was a neighbor of John and Catherine Snyder in OH in 1850. They might apply to a relative of his who was one generation earlier (a father or uncle?).

As indicated earlier, a review of the 1830 census entries for John Snyder did not suggest that any of the four entries describe the family that I am seeking.



The baptismal record (Star 1) is the basis of the speculation about the association of John Snyder (OH) with the Phillip Snyder family(ies) in Cumberland County. And, although the relation is truly speculative at this point, the geographic proximity to the other pieces of information make it very attractive.

Stars 4 and 13 represent multiple bits of information about the Phillip Snyder family that I believe lived just south of New Kingstown. This location of Star 3 fits with on-line information as well as a publication of the Cumberland County Historical Society – *First Families of Old Cumberland County: Vol. XVIII – Mechanicsburg and White Rocks*, by Eschenmann and Barner. Page 42 (and others) describe tracts of land associated with Phillip Snyder and Baltzer Snyder that lie just south of New Kingstown. Taken together



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with the information presented earlier from St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in New Kingstown, there is a nice view of the Phillip Snyder families in the area – who the family members were and where they farmed. Here is an image of the part of the map that shows the tracts (MCH 40, 42, 120) owned by Phillip Snyder in the early 1800s. The distance between Mechanicsburg and New Kingstown is about 5 miles.



Three tags (Stars 5, 6, and 7) show rough locations associated with key males in the Solander/Selanders family that I have described in a separate document. Valentine and Francis are brothers, and William is the son of Valentine. William is also a neighbor of John Snyder and Simon Culp in OH in 1850. Their proximity to the Phillip Snyder and Simon Culp family is perhaps of significance. Star 5 is placed according to the Silver Spring Meeting House mentioned in the transcription of the 1830 census entry for William Selanders (Solander).

Star 8 indicates the location of the marriage of Simon Culp and Ellen Selanders in 1828, just before they moved to OH. Ellen is a daughter of Valentine Selanders (sister to William). These are neighbors of John and Catherine Snyder in OH in 1850. Simon is one of three brothers with whom I have established a genetic link to my mother. This is described in a separate document describing the Culp families.

Star 9 indicates the 1830 census entry for Simon Culp, which appears next to that for Valentine Selanders.

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Lastly, Star 14 roughly locates an 1830 census entry for a John Snyder family that might be of interest. This is not clear, however.

DNA Analysis

Autosomal Matching


Using an approach similar to that used to find Culp connections at the time of about 1800, the following match was discovered. That has led to Sarah Snyder, who could be John Snyder's sister, which would explain the match.

See <u>https://www.familysearch.org/tree/person/details/L8Q8-NWK</u>. The amount of matching DNA is 28cM, which is about right for a common ancestor living in about 1800. The bulk of the records associated with Sarah are geographically associated with Carlisle and just west of there (around Newville).

I have contacted the owner of the tree for details, if any exist.

Mitochondrial DNA

As noted above, using the tree building facility at 23andme, I have constructed a tree based on autosomal matches for my mother. By inspection of descendants of Catherine Snyder along maternal lines, I have determined that her haplogroup is T2F1. This may be useful at some point.

Conclusions

The fate of John and Catherine Snyder after 1850 has been so far impossible to determine. Perhaps there are records that would help understand their fates and the nature of their ancestors. I will continue to look with the help of a contacts in OH.

DNA evidence has provided a significant link of my mother to Simon Culp (b.~1801) and his brothers through her great grandmother Susannah Snyder (daughter of John and Catherine). This most likely argues in favor of Catherine being a sister of the Culp brothers. More information about the Culp family might prove/disprove the proposed nature of the relationship evidenced by the DNA matching.

Also, the possible connection to Sarah Snyder through DNA matching may prove to be very useful.

For now, however, even though built on circumstantial (spatial proximity) evidence, the best solution seems to be that John Snyder (b.1804 according to the 1850 census) is a son of Phillip Snyder (b.1774). And, his wife, Catherine, is a sister of the brothers Simon, Andrew, and Samuel Culp.

I have contacted the Cumberland County Historical Society to help find a marriage record for John and Catherine as well as a birth record for daughter Susannah. They may have additional information that I will pursue. 
Here is a story that I keep in my head to keep all the information together. It may be totally fictitious. -

The elder Phillip Snyder in the east settled near New Kingstown. His wife's name was Barbara. They may be connected somehow with the western Phillip and George Snyder clan. The western clan may have had an association with a Simon Culp who could be the father of Simon Culp (b.~1801).

The eastern elder Phillip had a family whose members were baptized in the Lutheran church in New Kingstown, near where the family had various tracts of land. The first son was also named Phillip, and his son Johann Jacob born in 1804 could be the person who appears as John Snyder in the 1850 OH census.

Nearby to the Snyder family (within 5-10 miles) can be found families associated with Valentine Selanders. And a younger Simon Culp is clearly associated with these families. Perhaps a sister of Simon's named Catherine married John Snyder. Many of these families can be found in OH in 1850. There may be an association with Mennonite or Church of the Brethren Churches.

And, here is a speculative family tree that summarizes all of the suspicions raised in this document. It may be nonsense, but it fits what little information exists.



A Speculative Family Tree


